The Seattle Indian Health Board commissioned Jones & Jones to conduct a feasibility study and prepare initial design concepts for a Conference & Community Resource Center for the Native American community.

The purpose of the study was to assess whether the renovation of the Health Board's existing Pearl Warren Building could continue to meet the agency's program objectives and be a good financial and community investment.

Our analysis supported the renovation.

Recommendations included:

- Changing building interior, exterior and site to better reflect Native American identity
- Providing spaces to accommodate healthy community events, ceremonies and activities
- Providing spaces for multiple uses: for elders, teaching, meetings

- Providing warm, comfortable, inviting spaces to exhibit Native creations
