Bainbridge Island, just west of Seattle, was the first site of the forced relocation of Japanese-Americans to internment camps at the beginning of World War II.

Jones & Jones is working with the Japanese-American community of Bainbridge Island and the City of Bainbridge Island to design a memorial and visitor center telling the story of the tragic episode in American history.

We have facilitated community meetings, defined concepts for memorial elements and given form to this story of family life during the removal and relocation, internment camp conditions and the return home to reclaim possessions, property and the future.

In May 2008, the President signed a bill designating the former Eagledale Ferry dock on Bainbridge Island as a National Historic Site and the memorial was opened to the public in 2011
